SYNOPSIS OF THE STORY

Part I. tells how Bassanio, a young Venetian, seeks the love of Portia, a princess, who by the will of her dead father may only marry the man who chooses by lottery a casket in which her picture is contained.

Bassanio appeals to his friend Antonio to lend him the money to try his fortune at Belmont. Antonio's wealth is in rich treasure-ships at sea and so to relieve Bassanio, he borrows three thousand ducats from Shylock, a grasping money lender, who, seeing a chance to ruin Antonio, lends the money on condition that if it is not repaid in three months, Shylock shall have a pound of Antonio's flesh.

The rest of Part I. tells how the suitors come and how Bassanio wins the hand of Portia.

Part II. relates how Antonio cannot repay Shylock and is brought to trial. Like the good fairy in old stories, Portia in disguise, for love of Bassanio, saves Antonio's life. Then she and her maid Nerissa play a merry trick upon their husbands, Bassanio and Gratiano, and all return to Belmont and live happily ever after.
